A Video Message from Bishop Tracy S. Malone at General Conference of the United Methodist Church April 23 – May 3, 2024



Greetings East Ohio Conference. I am here at the General Conference in Charlotte, North Carolina. There is a beautiful spirit here in this place as delegates from across the world-wide United Methodist Church gather to do the work of holy conferencing.

Today was a historic day here at General Conference. Delegates passed legislation that will remove restrictive language from the Book of Discipline that marginalizes our LGBTQIA+ siblings in language that has been there since 1972. Their decision will pave the way for the full welcome and inclusion of our LGBTQIA+ siblings in the total life of the church.

This afternoon the delegates completed the work of the regionalization legislation which allows for the United Methodist Church to remain connected as a world-wide church but also allows for each region of the United Methodist Church to contextualize their ministry.

The Conference continues and the delegation continues to do their work and they will conclude their work on Friday. Upon the completion of the General Conference there will be more information that will be shared with you and there will be opportunities for you to learn more about how what has happened here at the General Conference impacts your life at the local church and in the Annual Conference.

We know that you will have questions and we will be providing an opportunity for you to be able to ask those questions. I will be working with our delegation from the East Ohio Conference to organize the time and space to give you the opportunity to ask those questions.

So yes there are some changes that are coming our way as we move into and live the next expression of the United Methodist Church. But here's what I need you to know: what has not changed, and what will never change, is what our mission is as a church – our mission of making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. What will not change is each of our calls to be disciples, to make disciples, to mature disciples of Jesus Christ, to be agents of God filling the hope of transformation in our communities and throughout the world and our call to continue to reach new people, and younger people, and more diverse people with the love and grace of our Lord Jesus Christ.

So I am inviting you to breathe, take a deep breath, let us continue to trust God for what God is doing. Let us continue to trust God for what God will do through each and every one of us and in and through the church. And let us trust God for that which is yet to come.

To God be the glory because we have this promise in God's Word: "Do not fear. Do not lean on your own understanding. In all of your ways acknowledge me and I will direct your paths."

- 3. Holy or Christian Conferencing is a practice John Wesley included, along with prayer, Scripture reading, fasting and the Lord's Supper as a way of experiencing God's grace. The roots are biblical. Leaders assert that every Christian should practice it, within and beyond the walls of the church. Holy Conferencing does not focus on winning and losing. It focuses on discerning where God is leading us. It focuses on prayer, rational and respectful conversation, and a belief that with God, all things are possible. Bishop Sally Dyck, who led the working group that refined the guidelines, credited the denominations young people for bringing the issue to the forefront. "Their example is a lesson for the whole church. We can do things differently, respectfully, and with God in the forefront."
 - **1.** Every person is a child of God.
 - **2.** Listen before speaking.
 - **3.** *Strive to understand from another's point of view.*
 - **4.** *Strive to reflect accurately the views of others.*
 - **5.** *Disagree without being disagreeable.*
 - **6.** *Speak about issues; do not defame people.*
 - 7. Pray, in silence or aloud, before decisions.
 - **8.** *Let prayer interrupt your busy-ness.*

"In our culture today, there's so much divisiveness that it's really important to call ourselves to the means of grace ... People, particularly in the United States, understand how uncivil conversation and discussion have become. People desire something different. In general society, there's fair amount of conversation about civil discourse. As Christians, we have a number of Scripture passages and admonitions in terms of how we treat one another."
